It was another busy year for Football South Australia.

Whilst Covid-19 still presented its challenges for the football community there has been a silver lining. In addition to highlighting the importance of fiscal discipline and a reminder of best hygiene practice, it has shown the football community can work together in a collaborative way towards our shared objectives to enhance the development and enjoyment of our game. Participation in football in South Australia in all its forms has continued to increase in 2022 and the future looks bright.

There have been many highlights of which to be proud in the past season. In particular were the performances of South Australian clubs in the Australia Cup final rounds with both Adelaide City FC and Modbury Jets SC reaching the round of 16. We were also very proud of the participation of four Socceroos from South Australia in the FIFA World Cup 2022 in Qatar.

Locally there were two outstanding teams who took out the treble for 2022. Adelaide City FC were crowned South Australian RAA National Premier League Premiers, National PRESIDENT'S REPORT 5



as well as winning The South Australian Women's National Premier League & State League Cup. Congratulations to both Clubs for these outstanding achievements.

2022 saw the departure of several long serving Board Directors. Sam Ciccarello served on the Board for 9 years, 6 years as President and Wendy Barry and Raz di Carlo have also made enormous contributions to the governance of

fortunate to have several very highly qualified "football people" who have put their hands up to give their time and expertise to contribute to the Board ensuring continuity whilst striving for ever increasing success for Football South Australia and our sport more generally.



A major milestone for the sport in South Australia this year was the long-awaited completion of our "Home of Football" within the State Sports Park at Gepps Cross. This facility was officially opened in September by Katrine Hillyard MP, Minister for Recreation, Sport, and Racing. We thank the State Government for their significant investment in this key piece of community infrastructure which will benefit South Australians of all ages for many years to come.

This first-class facility offers three full sized pitches, changing rooms, ten fully enclosed 5-a-side pitches, a function centre, meeting rooms and office space for the Football SA staff. The transfer of our operations and staff, whilst complex, was completed smoothly, maintaining a high level of service to our stakeholders. The facility was almost at capacity immediately on opening and our staff needed to hit the ground running as we played host to many high-profile football events including the CommBank Junior Matildas Training Camp, Australia Cup rounds and RAA National Premier League championships as well as workshops, conferences, and a myriad of other events. The positive feedback from our customers is a credit to our staff who have embraced the new challenges with enthusiasm. Although more pitches are still needed to accommodate demand, having two artificial pitches at this facility enabled Football SA to assist cubs whose pitches had become unplayable when the rains came, enabling competitions to be completed on time.

The new facility now provides a home for the Football SA Museum, which showcases the history of the sport and puts on a professional display of some of the trophies, awards, and other

memorabilia. The Museum is unique. In addition to providing pride in our history and past glories which can be admired by South Australians young and old, it has received very favourable comments from many interstate visitors who come to the site. Thanks must go to the tireless work of the volunteers on the Museum and Awards & Honour Committee who research, document, and present our sport so professionally.

We have added several new sponsors to our highly valued portfolio of loyal supporters. Commercial and corporate partners share our values of partnership and collaboration and have been enthusiastic in taking new opportunities to align with our sport. Many of our sponsors are "best in class" and with national or worldwide product or service leadership. We are grateful to all our sponsors for their support. ServiceFM is the naming rights partner for our new facility, visibly embracing its support for our sport in what is now called ServiceFM Stadium.

Excitement is building as we look forward to the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup and the role Adelaide will play in hosting teams from eight countries and five early round matches when the competition commences in July 2023. Football South Australia has worked with the State Government, Clubs and Councils to implement its Women's World Cup Legacy plan. The Legacy plan which includes three strategic pillars via Participation, Infrastructure and Women in Leadership is now fully activated.

Actions aimed at *participation* include the introduction of Northern Legacy Leagues, School based competitions for girls, which is now expanding, and a variety of new competitions PRESIDENT'S REPORT



which enhance the opportunity to play and to extend the reach of football to wider audiences to people of all ages and abilities. Football South Australia has also secured funding for four Regional Development Officers who will be based in rural communities with a remit to increase engagement and participation in our sport.

Infrastructure remains a focus with our ambition to provide the best places to play. We have targeted partnerships with councils and schools in both regional and metropolitan locations and planning for additional facilities is well advanced, subject to funding.


Women in leadership is the third strategic pillar of the plan where activities have been both varied and well supported and covering a panoply of topics of relevance to women in sport and in society more generally. Often in collaboration with other organisations, Football South Australia has facilitated activities such as speakers, workshops, seminars,

mentoring opportunities and exposure to key figures and role models in what is a busy calendar of events and experiences which will continue in 2023.

Together, with the State Government's support, we are confident there will be a significant Legacy for football long after the 2023 Women's World Cup has finished.

The audited financial statements with this Annual Report show a modest surplus which is a very pleasing result in this difficult financial climate. Football South Australia's hard working staff under CEO, Michael Carter, are to be congratulated and thanked for their efforts. They set a benchmark for the development of a performance culture and mindset of which our sport can be proud.

Lastly, I would like to thank all our Clubs, our volunteers, our match officials and players who make our sport what it is today and who choose to make football their "happy place".

Season 2022 has been a very positive year for the game in South Australia, with many highlights throughout.

Modbury Jets SC, Adelaide City FC and Adelaide United FC all did the state proud in the Australia Cup with all making it through to the round of 16, while Adelaide United continued their strong tradition late in the cup competition, making it through to the Quarter Finals.

The performance from Adelaide City in the RAA National Premier League (NPL) and West Adelaide SC in the Women's National Premier League (WNPL) by winning the League, Cup and Grand Finals respectively, is a very rare achievement and is certainly deserving of significant recognition.

Football SA's digital presence continued to grow increasing the number of eyeballs enjoying not only match highlights or goals of the week, but community stories of significance that impact on the South Australian football family. Other significant highlights include the opening of significant assets for the game including the Southern Football Facility for Cove FC, the completion of Karinya Reserve for Sturt Lions FC, the completion of new change facilities for Modbury Jets SC and the significant development at Regency Oval, home of Croydon FC. The venues are going to leave a lasting impression on the game and its participants for many years to come.

The official opening of the World Class State Centre for Football on Saturday 16 July, now known as Service FM Stadium, was a significant milestone for football in the state. This important development has achieved the desired outcome of establishing a community level facility that can cater for grassroots football through to the elite level of the game. The investment by the State Government, our corporate partners and Football South Australia have connected the entire game.

Every piece of infrastructure developed over the past 7 years has reached capacity prior to opening. There is no doubt that on the back of the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup there is a need for further investment in strategically located areas to cater for the participation demand and achieve outcomes in line with government objectives. Turning players away from the game is not good for the community, families, or children.

Football has demonstrated an ability to partner and deliver great community outcomes and in doing so has enabled Football SA to develop the game at a community level and keep the community active. Strong demand for participation is justifying the investment in facilities. Thank you to our Sports Minister, Katrine Hildyard for the support of Football in the state.

From a corporate point of view, Football SA is very fortunate to have the backing of corporate Adelaide. In 2022 we announced ServiceFM as naming rights partner of the State Centre for Football for the next 5 years. During the year we also welcomed OneWorld LED, Sportal, Schweppes and Balfours to the Football Family in South Australia. We also extended many existing corporate partnerships. The corporate family within football in the state is a formidable force and we thank you for partnering with us.

The annual RAA Celebration of Football returned in force in 2022 with a record attendance celebrating the collective achievements of the game from community to the elite level of the game. The Sergio Melta Medal winner was the popular Alex Mullen, while the Shirley Brown medal for the WNPL went to Rachel Quigley. Four new members were inducted to the South Australian Football Hall of Fame and congratulations to Ray Matthews, Peter Duke, Jill Latimer and David Leane.

October saw the launch of the inaugural Summer Football Fives competition at ServiceFM Stadium. The purpose built 10 court facility was beaming with activity and welcomed just over 1000 participants to the newly formed competition. The Football Fives pitches were heavily used during 2022 by schools, community groups, full time development squads and casual users.

In November we watched the Subway Socceroos compete in the 2022 Qatar FIFA World Cup and we of course look forward to the build up to the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup to be hosted on home soil. In partnership with the South Australian State Government, Football SA received \$460,000 over the next two years to support the WWC Legacy Plan pillar of participation. The funding enables Football SA to employ Regional Development Officers to grow the game in regional South Australia. Full time staff are to be deployed in the Limestone Coast, Riverland, Eyre Peninsula and Adelaide Hills.

For the team of dedicated staff at Football SA, season 2022 was unlike any before. Navigating the final impacts of Covid-19 on the competition, while preparing for our move to ServiceFM Stadium proved to be a huge challenge for the group. I am very pleased to report that the transition went extremely well but could not have been achieved without the collective team approach. The number of events held, external functions attracted, new competitions commenced and the partnership with the surrounding community could not have gone better and congratulations to all involved.

I would like to thank retiring President Sam Ciccarello, directors Wendy Barry and Orazio Di Carlo for their hard work and dedication throughout their time as directors of the Board. The contribution made by all was substantial. The passing of Dave Hewitson was terrible news for the football community and our



OVERVIEW

The 2022 season continued as per the previous season with each competition (RAA National Premier League (NPL), State League 1, and State League 2) with 12 teams competing in each division.

This was another COVID-19 disrupted season with teams needing to accommodate multiple changes throughout the early stages of the season. Clubs were very receptive of the COVID-19 policy which allowed matches to be postponed if a certain number of players within a team had the virus as per Covid-19 Regulations.

All clubs are to be commended for their fantastic showing of commitment and resilience to continue to work through these disruptions that enabled the season to conclude as scheduled for 2022.

It was also a historic year for football within South Australia with the opening of the State Centre for Football (ServiceFM Stadium) at Gepps Cross. The venue was a host for all Grand Finals, Australia Cup Preliminary Round Federation Cup Finals, multiple RAA NPL and State League fixtures along with numerous other major events and provided a state-of-the-art experience for spectators, coaches, match officials and players.

RAA NATIONAL PREMIER LEAGUE (NPL) AND STATE LEAGUE 1 AND 2 COMPETITIONS

Following on from a disrupted 2021 season, the RAA National Premier League, State League 1, and State League 2 league schedules were back to normal with Round 1 commencing the weekend of 18 February 2022 in line with the Football Australia Domestic Match Day Calendar.

2022 provided a spectacular display of Grand Finals with a standalone RAA NPL final on 9 September between Adelaide City and Adelaide Comets, followed by two promotion deciders for the State League 1 and State League 2 competition on 10 September 2022. All three Grand Finals were played in front of significant crowds at ServiceFM Stadium.

Moving into the new facility allowed for a 'festival of football' for all Senior Grades Grand Final's with the RAA NPL, State League 1, and State League 2 U18s and Reserves all playing their finals in the lead up to the aforementioned Senior State League finals on 10 September. This was a spectacular showcase of South Australian Football with over 7,000 people in attendance across the 8 finals during the day.

In the RAA NPL, 22 rounds of home and away fixtures were played. At the end of the home and away season, Adelaide City claimed the League Premiership following a 6-0 victory of Adelaide Olympic to beat Campbelltown City to the premiership by 1 point.

Football SA also reintroduced the Grand Final Breakfast for the first time since the 2019 season. It was great to see members from all clubs gather at ServiceFM Stadium to celebrate what was a monumental season for football in South Australia.

The RAA NPL SA Grand Final saw a replay of the 2021 final between Adelaide City and Adelaide Comets. Adelaide City capped off their season by defeating Adelaide Comets in a 2-1 victory, taking out a back-to-back RAA NPL SA Championship. It was another extremely healthy crowd of 3,500 people.

In the State League 1 home and away season, Modbury Jets were the dominant team all season taking out the premiership by 6 points. The chasing pack could hardly be separated with 2 points between 2nd and 4th.

West Adelaide took on Para Hills Knights in the State League 1 Grand Final to secure promotion into the RAA NPL. The match was an absolute thriller finishing 4-3 in favour of West Adelaide who earnt their spot back into the top division for the first time since 2019.

In the State League 2 competition, Adelaide Cobras were crowned league Premiers after battling closely with rivals Vipers FC throughout the season. Adelaide Cobras ended up securing promotion into the State League 1 competition with a 2-1 victory of Gawler Eagles in Round 21 of the season.

The State League 1 Final was another promotion thriller with Vipers FC taking on Western Strikers in front of another packed crowd at ServiceFM stadium. Vipers scored a 90th minute equaliser to make the game 3-3 and take it into extra-time. A goal in the 100th minute of the game was all that would separate the two teams with Vipers winning the match 4-3 AET.

AUSTRALIA CUP | FEDERATION CUP

The National Cup competition returned in 2022 with a new name, Australia Cup, and saw some exceptional performances from Community and Federation clubs. As per previous seasons Football Australia confirmed that South Australia would receive two Member Federation spots in the Australia Cup Final Rounds. The two teams to progress to the Australia Cup Round of 32 were the two teams that win the Australia Cup Preliminary Rounds Qualifying Finals.

The first Qualifying Final saw Eastern United, and Adelaide City battle it out with Adelaide City easing into the Federation Cup Final and gaining qualification. The second Qualification Final, saw Modbury Jets qualify after defeating Vipers FC. This was a valiant effort from Eastern United (State League 1) and Vipers FC (State League 2) who exceeded all expectations throughout the competition.

Once both teams had qualified into the Australia Cup Final Rounds, the competition name reverts to the Federation Cup.

Adelaide City completed the double after beating Modbury Jets with a dominating 5-0 win to become the 2022 Federation Cup Champions. Both teams earning a spot in the Australia Cup Final Rounds, a fantastic achievement particularly for Modbury Jets who reside in the State League 1 competition.

Adelaide City played Queensland outfit, Logan Lighting at Marden Sports Complex in the Round of 32 and came out victorious following a 1-0 victory. Modbury Jets travelled to

Western Australia to play Armadale and secured their spot in the Round of 16 of the competition alongside Adelaide City with a convincing 5-2 victory.

The Australia Cup Round of 16 saw both Modbury Jets and Adelaide City face A-League opposition. Modbury Jets were outclassed by the eventual Cup winners, Macarthur FC, in a match that finished 4-0 to the Victorian side.

Adelaide City drew Adelaide United which was the second consecutive Adelaide derby after Adelaide Olympic drew the same opponent in the same stage in 2021. The match was played at ServiceFM Stadium in front a massive crowd of 3,350. Adelaide City took the match down to the wire, only being defeated 4-1 on penalties following a 1-1 draw after 120 minutes.

Congratulations to all teams that participated and to Adelaide City and Modbury lets on a great campaign.



2023 COMPETITION

The 2023 Senior Men's Competition Structure will remain unchanged and will consist of

RAA National Premier League – 12 Teams State League 1 – 12 Teams State League 2 – 12 Teams

Promotion and relegation will occur across all three competitions. In the RAA National Premier League and State League 1, two teams (12th and 11th Place) will be relegated to State League 1 and State League 2 respectively with the League Premier and League Champion of State League 1 and State League 2 gaining promotion to the National Premier League and State League 1 respectively.

Upon review, the Final Series Format has been amended for the 2023 RAA NPL, State League 1 & State League 2

WOMEN'S NATIONAL PREMIER LEAGUE (WNPL)

The 2022 season saw a restructuring of the Women's National Premier League to a ten-team competition which created a greater number of pathway opportunities for our elite female footballers. The introduction of Modbury Vista SC and WT Birkalla SC to the WNPL brought with it renewed enthusiasm and interest in the newly formatted 18 round competition. Our WNPL Clubs continue to invest in player development and pathways and the league is a testament to their commitment.

The WNPL Preseason competition enabled teams to prepare for the upcoming season. The preseason competition commenced in early February with Salisbury Inter SC defeating West Adelaide 2-1 in the final. All the preseason games were held at The Parks Football Centre which created a community feel and built a sense of anticipation for the start of the 2022 season.

The league was extremely competitive and entertaining with ladder positions being decided on the final round. The clear stand out team this season was West Adelaide SC who finished 7 points clear of Adelaide City FC, under the guidance of Tracey Jenkins. Tracey's team claimed all three trophies on offer, League Premiers, League Champions and the Women's National Premier League and State League Cup.

In front of 1200 spectators at ServiceFM Stadium on Friday 23 September, West Adelaide were crowned 2022 Women's National Premier League Champions. The showcase match against Adelaide City was a tense and entertaining game of football with a sole Racheal Quigley goal in the 28th minute separating the two teams. Racheal found the back of the net 26 times in the league claiming the Golden Boot award and she was also awarded the Shirley Brown Medallist with 23 votes. Emilia Murray from Football SA NTC came second on 20 votes.

The Women's National Premier League and State League Cup was held with 28 teams vying for cup glory. Over 2100 fans

flocked to ServiceFM Stadium on Sunday 14 August for a full day of Women's Cup Football action with many staying behind to see the traditional rivals West Adelaide and Adelaide City go head-to-head. The final score was 3-1 to West Adelaide with Meleri Mullan named Player of the Match.

WOMEN'S STATE LEAGUE (WSL)


The Women's State League in its second year saw teams compete for top spot and automatic promotion to next year's Women's National Premier League. The WSL Preseason competition enabled teams to prepare for the upcoming season with South Adelaide Panthers FC taking out the competition with a 3-0 win over Modbury Jets SC. Adelaide Hills Hawks FC, Campbelltown City SC and Elizabeth Grove SC were granted entry into the WSL.

Flinders United WFC was the standout, under the guidance of Joel Porter, the team remained undefeated for the season finishing 5 points ahead of second placed South Adelaide. With the final round to be played Flinders United gained promotion into the Women's National Premier League for the 2023 Season.

On Sunday 11 September, South Adelaide, having finished the season in second place, took on Fulham United FC in the 2022 Women's National Premier League and Women's State League Play Off game at ServiceFM Stadium. South Adelaide was defeated by Fulham United 3 goals to nil in the play off. South Adelaide was very competitive, created multiple goal scoring opportunities but it wasn't their day in front of goals.

The Ann Sergeant Medal was awarded to Poppy Waterford from Modbury Jets. Poppy had an outstanding year taking out the Women's State League player of the year with 27 votes, Eliza







to Eliza Macdonald-Hall, scoring 19 goals for Flinders United.

COMMUNITY AND JUNIOR GIRLS

The Junior girls season saw a total of 79 teams across 8 leagues between Under 13's and Under 17's with a 10% increase in teams from 2021. Girls only MiniRoos teams again grew in 2022, with a total of 59 teams across U7, U9 and U11 age groups, with a total of 18% increase from 2021. The Under 13's Girls leagues changed to a 9 v 9 format this season which meant that 11 more teams entered the competition and resulted in the establishment of another Under 13 girls league.

The increase in number of teams within the MiniRoos and Junior Girls have come from existing clubs that are committed to their junior girl's program and offering a pathway to as many young girls as possible. This year we saw 32 local clubs enter at least one girls' team between the age of Under 7's through to Under 17's. In the lead up to the FIFA Women's World Cup 2023 our sport will continue to experience rapid growth in participation and there is an opportunity for clubs to leave a legacy and cater for females willing to play football.

Aldinga Soccer Club, Pontian Eagles, Playford Pirates, Rowe Park United, Salisbury Sharks, Stirling Districts, Western Strikers, and Woodside Warriors entered a women's community team this season having not entered a team the previous year.

1, Northern Wolves winning Division 4 North and Salisbury Sharks winning Division 5 North only losing 1 match. Congratulations to Salisbury Inter who were undefeated and won the Division 2 title.

In our Junior Girls leagues, there were several teams that won their league undefeated including Fulham United in the Under 15 Girls Blue, Adelaide University in the Under 13 Girls Purple North. Four teams only lost 1 match for the year, they were Modbury Vista in the Under 15 Girls Red, Adelaide University in the Under 13 Girls Red, Adelaide Hills in the Under 13 Girls Blue and Noarlunga United in the Under 13 Girls Purple. Congratulations to all teams on their fantastic achievements.

The 2022 Girls and Women's Cup finals were held at ServiceFM Stadium on the Sunday 14 August where we saw Adelaide University win the Under 13 Girls Cup, Modbury Vista win the Under 15 Girls Cup and Adelaide Hills win the Under 17's Girls Cup. Modbury Vista claimed the Division 1/2/3 Cup and Northern Wolves claimed the Division 4/5/6 Cup.

The 2022 season was very exciting and successful, it is a testament to the hard work, time, and commitment many volunteers have to their clubs. Football SA appreciates the effort of these individuals that contribute to providing football opportunities for girls and women. Our clubs and its many volunteers must be commended for their ability to work through the challenges and uncertainty that Covid-19 presented throughout the season.

- JUNIOR COMPETITIONS REPORT -



JUNIOR PREMIER & STATE LEAGUES

The first competitive fixtures of the 2022 Junior Premier League (JPL) and Junior State League (JSL) seasons commenced on March 20 with the final matches being played on October 2.

The 2022 season did not go without disruptions, between the rise in COVID-19 cases and extreme weather, hundreds of games were forced to be postponed during the year. To ensure we completed a full season, numerous games were moved to available weekends and mid-week. This resulted in numerous games over a short period of time; all clubs, players, coaches, volunteers and parents showed a great amount of cooperation and flexibility to ensure these games were played.

Across all Junior Premier & State Leagues, there was a total of 297 teams registered, which saw an increase of 18 teams from the 2021 season.

2022 provided many challenges but also brought with it many highlights, including the introduction of new clubs in Football SA junior competitions. We welcomed Northern Wolves to the Junior Competition in the U17's.

During the season the Junior Premier and State Leagues comprised of a minimum of 18 through to 26 matches.

Another highlight included the inaugural Sammy D Violence Prevention Round which took place on the weekend of 17-19 July. The purpose of this round was to raise awareness and reduce violence both on and off the football pitch. Clubs were provided blue armbands to wear on the day as well as promotional material to display across their club. This round had the fewest red cards/reports of any round throughout the season.







2022 JUNIOR CUP

This year's Junior Cup Competition Finals were played on September 18 and held at ServiceFM Stadium for the first time. The event was a great opportunity to show the state-of-the-art facility, which was the perfect venue to bring together all players, coaches, match officials, volunteers and parents to celebrate a rewarding season.

The cup final was run slightly different to previous seasons with the U12's, U14's and U16's all kicking off at 9:30am followed directly by the U13's, U15's and U17's which started at 11:30am. It was a great day to watch football which as reflected by having approximately 1500 people come through the gates.

Adelaide Croatia Raiders dominated proceedings, taking home 3 trophies as the U13, U16 and U17 champions.

MetroStars (U12), South Adelaide (U14) and Para Hills Knights (U15) were the other teams to be crowned champions.

MINIROOS

Each year the Miniroos numbers have been growing exponentially as players are becoming increasingly eager to play the game from a young age. The total number of teams that participated in MiniRoos leagues in 2022 was 386 teams - up from 359 in 2021.

The MiniRoos program is an essential pathway for clubs to further their junior programs and provide them with the foundations of football from the grass roots. The MiniRoos program has proven to help clubs establish a sound base to their junior teams through the focus on learning fundamental new skills, being active and making life-long friends.

Although 2022 has been a different year with many challenges faced, all the clubs have shown us that their resilience and love for the game has remained unweathered.

- FUTSAL COMPETITIONS REPORT -



The 2022 futsal calendar commenced differently given the cancellation of the 2022 National Futsal Championships due to COVID-19. This, however, did not discourage numerous opportunities for players, coaches, and match officials to be involved locally.

ACADEMY

Football South Australia (FSA) continued with its Futsal Academy based at St Clair Recreation Centre on Tuesday evenings during the school term, expanding to Roma Mitchell Secondary College in Term 4 on Monday nights. 114 boys and girls participated throughout the year in weekly training sessions guided by some of our state futsal coaches; an increase from the 84 participants in 2021. Our academy teams also participated in regular school holiday carnivals.

Our School Holiday Futsal Carnivals held in April, July and October have become a regular fixture on the futsal calendar, attracting 278 participants across the April and July Carnivals. Each carnival was held on one day across multiple pitches at St Clair Recreation Centre with several matches for each of the participating teams of boys and girls from Under 8 through to Under 16's. A large contingent of local national league and futsal clubs were well represented amongst the carnivals.

COUNTRY FUTSAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The annual Football SA Country Futsal Championships provide regional futsal associations with the opportunity to participate against various associations. In addition to this, players are identified to attend state trials in Adelaide later in the year with the potential for selection to the Football SA State Futsal teams participating at the Football Australia National Futsal Championships to be held in January the following year.

The 2022 Country Futsal Championships was scheduled for Sunday 10 July at the Minlaton Basketball Stadium, in the Yorke Peninsula. Due to a clash with the outdoor season and player availability, the Country Futsal Championships was unable to proceed. Football South Australia will endeavor to hold the Country Championships in Minlaton in early 2023.

The Football SA Country Futsal Championships also provides an opportunity for match officials, both locally and from metro Adelaide, to continue their futsal referee development and potential pathway toward Football Australia National Futsal Championships.



STATE FUTSAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The State Futsal Championships held on Monday 19 December 2022 with junior boys, girls, youth men and women and Athletes With Disabilities (AWD) teams all participating across 5 various categories to be crowned Football SA's State Futsal Champions.

212 players, 20 match officials and countless team officials, volunteers, Football SA Staff, St Clair Recreation Centre staff and parents contributed to the fantastic spectacle. 5 pitches were in operation across the day with a record 110 matches being contested from early in the day group matches, to playoffs and finals to conclude proceedings.

The State Futsal Championships are Football SA's precursor to the Football Australia National Futsal Championships held in January the following year. Many players who participate here go on to represent South Australia at the Nationals, with the next opportunity to represent the state being at the 2023 Football Australia National Futsal Championships to be held in Melbourne, Victoria at Parkville – Melbourne Sports Centres.

Thank you to all who participated throughout the day and made it the success that it was.



FUTSAL COMPETITIONS

Our affiliated futsal bodies do an amazing job and coordinate competitions all year round for futsal players of all abilities. Football SA in 2023, will continue to work closely with our current affiliated members and look at ways to bring further clubs, leagues, and associations into the Football SA futsal family to provide futsal with the opportunity to develop and progress.

This year Football SA welcomed Pro Futsal as a new affiliate; a fantastic Futsal body that operates out of St Clair Recreation Centre on a weekly basis. Showcasing some of the best open futsal South Australia has to offer.

Riverland Futsal, Yorke Peninsula, Port Augusta, and Jamestown continue to drive futsal in regional areas of our state, with healthy competitions and some positive development occurring.

In metro Adelaide, Futsal SA continue to deliver a sound competition for seniors on Wednesday and Sunday evenings all year round, and summer competitions from early October through finals held in mid-December.

Football SA would like to acknowledge all our futsal members and the tireless work that occurs behind the scenes. Without your support or the opportunities to participate, be that as a players, coach, referee or spectator, would be near on impossible. Football SA looks towards 2023 to increase the opportunities and grow the game of futsal.









In 2022 Football South Australia launched Football Five5, at ServiceFM Stadium on the 10 state-of-the-art purpose built 5-a-side pitches.

The game of 5-a-side is played in an enclosed tennis court sized artificial pitch, with smaller goals and shorter game length. Senior games consist of two 20-minute halves with a 5-minute break and junior games being two 15-minute halves. The game is designed to be fast paced for the full duration of the match, with the ball only deemed out of play when it hits the back fence behind either goal or goes out of the cage. As a result, the game has very few stoppages and allows players to utilise the walls to their advantage, making for great viewing and an exciting match.

Football Five5 is a great way to meet people, stay fit and have some fun all whilst playing football. There are a range of

different leagues and competitions for all types of footballers. From beginners wanting to have a social kick around to semi-professionals trying their hand at small-sided football.

The first ever Football Five5 SA Winter Leagues commenced on 18 July 2022 which saw 14 open men's teams compete in an 8-week social competition every Monday night. The teams thoroughly enjoyed themselves, however looking ahead to the Football Five5 Summer Leagues there was room to grow into Adelaide's premier 5-a-side social competition.

Football South Australia held two exhibition 5-a-side games broadcast live on Channel 44, a first of its kind. The two games played were a Women's National Premier League Grand Final rematch between West Adelaide Soccer Club and Adelaide City Football Club and a National Premier League powerhouse clash between Adelaide City Football



Club and Campbelltown City Soccer Club. Both games were fast, skillful, and full of goals with some of South Australia's best semi-professional footballers showing the best of what they have to offer.

West Adelaide SC and Adelaide City FC took out the victory for both the women's and men's games respectively. Both matches were played in great spirits and was a fantastic promotion for the game seeing team registrations for the upcoming Football Five5 Summer Leagues increase significantly.

The Football Five5 Summer Leagues commenced on Monday 10th October and was a huge success, with a total of 117 teams across Senior Men, Women, Mixed and Junior competitions. Of those 117 teams 56 were Senior Men, 8 Senior Women, 4 Mixed and the remaining 49 being Juniors. There was over 1000 active registered participants competing Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday nights at the ServiceFM Stadium. Many of whom are new participants of a Football SA competition.



The Football Five5 SA Summer Leagues consisted of a 10-week season including 2 weeks of finals. Senior games were played on Monday and Wednesday nights across three timeslots. Whilst Junior games were also played across three timeslots on Thursday nights.

Football Five 5 offers a product to footballers of all ages that want to continue playing the game socially. With the possibilities of where this game goes being endless, the purpose built 5-a-side pitches have been used for more than just Football Five 5, with



teams using them for trainings, coaching courses, gala days, school excursions and more.

Football Five5 also presented itself as a great way for young inexperienced referees to gain experience in Football. 67 referees attended the Football Five5 referee courses, 30 of which weren't previously registered with Football SA. The referees enjoyed the fast paced and social nature of the game.

The 2022 Football Five5 season proved an overwhelming success and we look forward to a bigger and better 2023 season.

- EASTERN ZONE PRIMARY SCHOOLS SOCCER ASSOCIATION -



The 2022 season kicked off on 14 May under the administration of Football SA for the second year. The Eastern Zone Primary School Association is an important grassroots competition providing participating opportunities for school aged children to be introduced to the sport in a fun and welcoming environment.

This year, Football SA introduced Under 6's and Under 7's into the competition for the first time, allowing more opportunities for younger players to participate in the sport. The introduction of 6's and 7's also provides a link from the Football in Schools program run by FSA Game Development Team into structured competition formats.

The 2022 season saw a total of 80 teams participating, a 14% increase from the season prior. This year students from Roma Mitchell High School were engaged to assist as Game Leaders and referees, further providing opportunities for students to gain practical experience after completing referee and game leader courses delivered by Football SA.

The Annual Interzone Championships between North West Junior Soccer Association (NWJSA) and Eastern Zone as well as the Cup Semi Finals and Finals were held at ServiceFM Stadium, the highlight of the year for some of the players who previously would not have had the opportunity to participate at a top-class Football Facility.

During the Final Round of the 12 Year Division matches at ServiceFM Stadium, players were presented with their winner and runner up medals by special guests Corey Artone (a product of the junior association) and current Adelaide United Captain, Craig Goodwin. The players were extremely excited and couldn't wipe the smiles off their faces.

Football SA would like to thank the dedicated supervisors who have volunteered their time throughout the year to ensure the competition has been ran to a high standard week in week out, thank you to Aldo Perilli OAM, Gabby Vistoli, Robert Goodall, Jack Sierat, Greg Brodie, David Walker and President John lannunzio.

- REFEREE REPORT -



In the 2022 season, Football SA saw a 34% increase in match officials with a total of 402 registered match officials in South Australia compared to 2021. The number of active female referees in Season 2022 almost doubled from Season 2021 with 43 active female match officials.

Football SA referees officiated across several competitions which included the Collegiate Soccer League, SA Masters League, Adelaide Hills Junior Soccer Association, Limestone Coast Football Association, Noarlunga and Districts Junior Soccer Association, Riverland Soccer Association, Port Lincoln Soccer Association and Jamestown Futsal. Our affiliation with South Australian Amateur League (SAASL) and South Australian Football Referees Association (SAFRA) saw a continued growth and development of match officials that officiated in that particular competition. Football SA had an overall average appointment coverage of 85% across all competitions in a Covid-19 affected season.

Referees continued to support the South Australian Junior Soccer Association by officiating both the State and Country Championships (with the assistance of the Sunraysia Referees Association). South Australian Match Officials were invited to attend Kanga Cup as referees and referee coaches. Football SA provided support to several school competitions including Sports Association for Adelaide Schools, School Sport SA, Independent Girls Schools Sports Association (IGSSA) and South Australian Primary School Amateur Sport Association (SAPSASA). Football SA would like to thank the affiliated competitions and associations for their support and assistance with match official development in 2022.

National Referee Training and Qualification Programs continued to be delivered to the football community in 2022. This includes club refereeing programs through Football SA's affiliation with SAASL and the Education through Football program. In 2022 there were 15 Level 4 refereeing courses held and 4 Level 3 Courses, as well as 2 Level 3 Assessor courses. These courses were delivered both regionally and within the metropolitan area, with over 220 individuals attending the Level 4 courses, 36 attending the Level 3 courses and 12 completing their Level 3 Assessor qualification. In addition to these, 14 participants completed the Futsal Level 3 and Futsal Laws of the Game course held in early November. With the introduction of the Football Five5 competition, we welcomed 36 qualified Football Five5 Referees.



In 2022, the Referee Academy continued to operate and develop the next generation of high performing youth match officials. The instruction of the Referee Academy continued with FIFA referee and Lead Academy Instructor Daniel Elder, with Coaching Advisory Group member Daniel Bryant as the Support Instructor. Multiple sessions were held throughout 2022 which assisted with the growth of potential future National Premier League and National League match officials with a larger focus towards preparing referees for senior football. This was also the inaugural year of the Referee Development Squad, which is positioned beneath the Referee Academy in the South Australian Match Official Development Pathway. The group focuses on the education and creation of high performing Level 3 referees. The Referee Development Squad was run by Football SA Referee Development Manager Angus MacDonald, which targeted different aspects of football to continue to improve these young referees.

The National Youth Championships and NTC Challenge returned in 2022. SA were requested to supply 2 female and 4 male referees for the respective tournaments. The Coaching Advisory Group ran an in depth selection process which resulted in 3 females and 6 males being shortlisted. All of these officials participated in a specialised preparation series. 3 female and 4 male officials attended the respective tournaments. They all performed at a high level, with numerous appointments to final series matches and with Tom Brinkworth winning 14 Boy's Referee of the Tournament.

This year saw the introduction of a new approach to senior referee development under the guidance of Michelle Smith in the role of Senior Referee Development. A Coaching Advisory Group (CAG) was established to grow the high performance of the senior match officials and to continue the development of emerging referees to be able to move into the senior referee panels. Two referees successfully achieved their level 1 referee qualification and eight achieved their level 2. The group oversaw the development of all registered match officials, and had a collaborative approach towards refereeing progress and improvement. The group also oversaw the selection and nomination process for the Elite Referee selection process (ERSL). This is the formal process for referees to progress to the A-Leagues, each state is asked for nominations to the Nationally run process.

Futsal continues to be an area of opportunity and growth for Football SA, with a new affiliation to ProFutsal which allows match officials to improve their skills and have more opportunity to officiate games at a high level. Futsal Nationals will occur in early 2023 which has seen two South Australian referee coaches attending in Andrew Murray and Raymond Grima.

In June 2022, with the need for our programs to be scalable, Legacy programs can be adapted to suit grassroots, school holiday & state development for across the broader football participant groups.

LEADERSHIP

Moving across 2022 and into 2023, leadership events dot the calendar with the intent of impacting as many young people as possible. Young female athlete events focusing on holistic health, tenacity and resilience, mental health, and relationships will be hosted in 2023. Partnering with the Office for Women, a 'Respect' campaign featuring trainings & workshops will be tailor- made for our members, officiating and coaching courses directed at secondary students and

other young females recognizing that skills learned on the pitch are directly transferrable to future employment.

Partnering with Football Australia, strong leadership programs targeting women in clubs, member federations and associations to provide leadership training, addressing non-sporting leadership content such as business development & finance, governance, media training, and providing committee/board opportunities. Additional leadership workshops will be adapted for clubs, with new programs seeking to engage local partners and provide additional training to volunteers. A newly designed media course allowing for greater female representation within the football space will include photography, videography, and commentary program and provide access to a breadth of matches from grassroots to the FIFA Women's World Cup.

LEGACY AMBASSADORS



200 DAYS TO GO CARNIVAL

The opportunity for growth during the Women's World Cup kicked off with the '200 Days to go' school carnival. An event providing access and inclusion to young people whose first touchpoint started here at the ServiceFM stadium. Important to the success and responsibility to our community has been partnerships with SA Police (SAPOL), Schools, Department of Human Services SA (DHS), Adelaide United FC and other impactful groups. The Legacy program's newly found leagues are playing a vital role in providing the first touchpoint to young girls across the Northern and Southern regions.

NORTHERN SCHOOLS LEGACY LEAGUE NETWORKING SESSION

Football SA were proud to present the Networking Session for School Principals, Delegates and PE Teachers held 31 August at ServiceFM Stadium. Guests watched the official Women's World Cup Draw in the ServiceFM Stadium function room which was attended by guests such as the Honourable Katrine Hildyard, former Matildas Tracey Jenkins and Sacha Wainright and members of the FSA Legacy League.

NORTHERN SCHOOLS GIRLS FOOTBALL LEAGUE

The Northern Schools Girls Football League is Football South Australia's first pilot competition focusing on engaging female participants aged 15-18 as part as our FIFA Women's World Cup Legacy Plan. The pilot competition had five foundation schools who have paved the way to further grow female football in 2023, they are:

St. Columba Gleeson College

Trinity College Parafield Gardens High School

Xavier College

Due to the success of the pilot competition, Football South Australia will be extending the competition to focus on Reception – Year 12 in 2023. So far, we have had 14 schools nominate 56 teams for next year.

FOOTBALL IN SCHOOLS

The Football in Schools program saw just over 1200 participants in 2022, 95% of these are new to the game. It is important to note that the Football in Schools program is a great transition point into organised football, with a healthy transition rate of 42% into clubs, association, or schoolbased football.



Training has commenced for a large intake of casual coaches to allow us to service more schools in 2023 and provide more opportunities for people to play the game, capitalising on the 2022 FIFA Men's World Cup and 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup.

REGIONAL CAMP

The 2022 Regional Camp was held in April at the new ServiceFM Stadium with 70 players coming from different regional areas in South Australia. As a result of the camp, 22 boys were selected to represent Regional South Australia in the Boys State Development Carnival in July. 18 girls were selected to represent Regional South Australia in the Girls State Development Carnival in October.

SCHOOL HOLIDAY CAMPS

Football South Australia launched a pilot School Holiday Training Camp with 34 participants in the October school holidays. Due to the success of the camp, a full school holiday product has been created and will go live from January 2023. The school holiday programs available are:

- 3-day Training Camps
- 2-day GK Camps
- One Day Camps

INTERSTATE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL CUP

Football SA was proud to support the interstate School Cup in July. ServiceFM Stadium hosted two South Australian Schools, St Peter's College, and Rostrevor College with visiting schools The Hutchins School from Tasmania, and Cranbrook School from New South Wales over 2 days which also included a

BLIND AND PARTIALLY SIGHTED FOOTBALL

Relationships have been fostered between the Football South Australia, Paralympics Australia and the South Australian School for the Vision Impaired resulting in training sessions, school holiday camps and ongoing strategic planning sessions with the goal of hosting the Partially Sighted Futsal National Championships, the inaugural National Women's Blind Football Camps, and the FIFA Women's World Cup Unity Pitch activation in 2023.

2022 NATIONAL PARA FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

The 2022 National Para Football Championship was held at the Gold Coast Performance Centre in September. South Australia's squad was represented by ten local players and one ACT player. The 2022 championship had more than 100 athletes participating across 8 teams representing their state with a historic all-female team from Capital Football featuring this year.

The team had been training together at Adelaide Atletico Football Club for the last two years, who also contributed to the development of the players. After four days of competition, Football SA's squad took on Queensland with the winner being awarded the Plate Final. Both teams were strong, but we saw South Australia show their determination with Riley Stubing and Luc Launder each netting the ball for SA. Zade Nethercott added to SA's tally for a 5-0 finish over the Sunshine State.

A huge congratulations to the Football SA National Squad that brought home the silverware and a big thankyou to Lucinda Bueti (Head Coach), Peita Liaptsis (Assistant Coach / Team Manager), Kayla Nemeth (Physiotherapist) and Rebecca Jovanovic (Team Official).







PHOENIX CUP

The 2022 Phoenix Cup was scheduled to take place on 3 December, which would have been a celebration of International Day of Disability. Unfortunately, the tournament could not go ahead as the weather exceeded Football South Australia's heat policy. The tournament has been rescheduled to 15 January 2023.

KICK-OUT HATE TOURNAMENT

The Kick-Out Hate tournament was an initiative funded by the Department for Human Services (DHS) in partnership with DHS, the Australian Federal Police, Football South Australia and SEDA College. The Kick-Out Hate initiative is a crime prevention event promoting inclusivity and diversity through football. Youth between the ages of 12-17 took part in a football tournament at ServiceFM stadium on 17th September, with a view to continue offering similar programs in the near future.

I am pleased and very proud to now call Adelaide home and work for Football South Australia to continue the great work that has already been achieved in the player and coach development space.

Richie Alagich and Cristiano Dos Santos work tirelessly with their teams of coaches to provide development experiences for many players. The success of player development over the years has been outstanding for the size of the state and the participation numbers in comparison to the others states and we aim to become the best state overall for player and coach development.

Our role as a Member Federation is to develop players and coaches in the state by providing support and programs for different types of players. A term we like to use is, right players in the right program with the right coach for that player.

We are writing this report off the back of a very respectable World Cup campaign for our national men's team. We have a huge opportunity to work collectively to build on this inspiration moving into another World Cup year in 2023 and establish the most successful pathway programs for youth in the country.

BOYS DEVELOPMENT

FULL TIME STATE PROGRAMS

Football SA has squads in U13, U14 and U15 age groups who train and play full time with the aim to maximise individual potential. Each team plays an age group up in the Junior Premier League (JPL) competition structure and players move freely between training sessions and games to experience a range of challenges.

Football SA coaches are supported to deliver an engaging and player centred curriculum based on individual development with

a laser focus on creating a positive learning environment. All teams competed well in their respective league and cup competitions in 2022 with many individuals performing well in age groups above their year of birth and over 20 players having game experiences with Adelaide United youth teams.

DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

These programs are designed for players registered at clubs to gain more football development experiences to accelerate their growth under the supervision of Football SA coaches. Over 350 players were involved in this year's State Development Program (SDP) and summer State Acquisition Program (SAP) with some exciting potential for the future being identified.

NATIONAL YOUTH CHAMPIONSHIPS

This year we returned to Coffs Harbour with 4 boys' teams who tested themselves against the country's best. Players were selected to represent South Australia from our Full Time State programs and the development programs. All players and staff represented us very well with many comments from technical staff around Australia complimenting us on our approach to playing brave and intelligent possession football whilst working collectively and passionately to win the ball back.

GIRLS DEVELOPMENT

FULL TIME STATE PROGRAMS

Our girls' squads are U14, U15, U16 and U18 and train and play full time at our State Centre, ServiceFM Stadium under the guidance of a team of Football SA coaching staff. Our U14 and U15 squads play in boys Junior Premier League (JPL) competitions to provide an optimal challenge and our older age groups compete in the Women's National Premier League (WNPL)



seniors and reserve competitions. All teams experienced a range of game outcomes and performances which will help players develop but we have highlighted that we need smaller squads and more game experiences to increase the total number of games girls play per year.

DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

In 2022 we experienced growth within our girl's development programs which is proving the interest in girls' development increasing and this will only continue with the FIFA Women's World Cup in 2023. Over 300 girls participated in our State Development Program (SDP) and Skill Acquisition Programs (SAP).

NATIONAL YOUTH CHAMPIONSHIPS:

September 2022, Football SA sent 3 teams to participate in the National Youth Competition (NYC). The week was unfortunately affected by bad weather, but the players were exposed to an invaluable development experience and can learn from some challenging games versus the bigger states. Our oldest group competed extremely well at the October National Training Centre (NTC) challenge with some respectable individual and team performances.

CURRENT & FORMER FOOTBALL SA PROGRAM PLAYERS

- Three Adelaide born players represented Australia at the FIFA World Cup with Adelaide Untied captain Craig Goodwin opening the scoring against France.
- Charlotte Grant had a great year representing her country with many starts for the Matildas and establishing herself at the highest level.
- Harry Crawford 2022 Boys U15 NYC player of the tournament.
- Noah Ellul 2022 Boys U14 goalkeeper of the tournament.
- 8 male players transitioned from our state programs to Adelaide United youth. Nestory Irankunda had a breakout year for Adelaide United scoring 3 A league goals and Musa Toure, Luka Jovanovic and Ethan Alagich also made their A league debut this season.
- 6 females transitioned from our state's programs to Adelaide United women's 2022-23 A league squad.
 Emilia Murray scored the winner in the opening game of this season.



BOYS' NATIONAL YOUTH TEAM SELECTION:

Nestory Irankunda, Fabian Talladira and Sotiri Phillis represented the Joeys at the Asia qualifiers in Melbourne.

Raphael Rodrigues, Yaya Dukuly, Steven Hall and Kane Vidmar represented the young Socceroos in qualifying for the Asia cup.

GIRLS' NATIONAL YOUTH TEAM SELECTION:

Emilia Murray captained the young Matildas at a recent Four Nations competition and Grace Wilson also represented her country at this competition and the Junior Matildas ASEAN Football Federation (AFF) earlier in the year.

Ella Tonkin played at the U20 World Cup in Cost Rica and has been a starting centre back for Adelaide United this season.

Nine talented players in total represented themselves and South Australia at National team training camps throughout the year which is a great achievement for all involved in girls football development.

COACH EDUCATION

Coach education is effectively workforce development, and Football SA's aim is to improve the offerings to help recruit, develop and retain the right type of people for each football environment in South Australia. In 2022 Football SA continued to deliver the C, B and A licences here in SA albeit a slightly different course program due to Covid-19 restrictions.

In 2023 Football SA will continue to deliver formal courses, the Coaching Conference and Coaching Workshops, as well as working with coaches and technical directors in their environments and delivering more specific development experiences that are relevant to their context. Football SA aims to raise the awareness and standards of coaching across the board and highlight to the whole football community that coaching is a key role in all desirable outcomes we collectively wish for in our game.

Special mention to Adrian Stenta who was awarded the coach of the year for the Liberty A league women's 2021-22 season.

FUTURE

Moving into 2023, Football SA will be conducting a full review on the competition structure and development programs. Clubs and players will be at the heart of the review and consulted along the way. Our vision is to implement a development ecosystem where everything is connected, and more players have access to more football which will inspire them to commit to the game long term.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 31 December 2022

NOTE 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

 $Football\ Federation\ SA\ Incorporated\ is\ a\ not-for-profit\ incorporated\ association,\ incorporated\ and$ domiciled in Australia. The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is Football $\label{prop:prop:control} \mbox{Federation SA Incorporated's functional and presentation currency}.$

Registered office and principal place of business

SA State Centre of Football Matildas Drive, Gepps Cross South Australia

The financial statements were authorised for issue on 29 March 2023.

NOTE 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

This special purpose financial report has been prepared for the purposes of complying with the Associations Incorporation Act 1985. The directors have determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Income Tax

The Association is not subject to income tax and therefore no income tax expense or income tax payable is shown in the financial statements.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from customers for goods sold in the ordinary course of business. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Accounts receivable are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less an allowance for expected credit losses.

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses.

Inventories

Inventories held for sale are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Investments and other financial assets

Investments and other financial assets are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs are included as part of the initial measurement, except for financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. Such assets are subsequently measured at either amortised cost or fair value depending on their classification. Classification is determined based on both the business model within which such assets are held and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset unless an accounting mismatch is being avoided.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows have expired or have been transferred and the incorporated association has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership. When there is no reasonable expectation of recovering part or all of a financial asset, it's carrying value is written off

Financial assets at amortised cost

A financial asset is measured at amortised cost only if both of the following conditions are met: (i) it is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets in order to collect contractual cash flows; and (ii) the contractual terms of the financial asset represent contractual cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest.

Impairment of financial assets

The incorporated association recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on financial assets which are either measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income. The measurement of the loss allowance depends upon the incorporated association's assessment at the end of each reporting period as to whether the financial instrument's credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition, based on reasonable and supportable information that is available, without undue cost or effort to obtain.

Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than its estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to its estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses recognised in surplus or deficit. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, including buildings and capitalised lease assets, is depreciated on a diminishing value basis over the asset's useful life commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are:

Leasehold improvements 5.0%
Plant and equipment 7.5% to 50%
Motor vehicles 17.5%

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing net proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses are recognised in surplus or deficit in the period in which they occur.

Right-of-use assets

A right-of-use asset is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for, as applicable, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date net of any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred, and, except where included in the cost of inventories, an estimate of costs expected to be incurred for dismantling and removing the underlying asset, and restoring the site or asset.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is the shorter. Where the incorporated association expects to obtain ownership of the leased asset at the end of the lease term, the depreciation is over its estimated useful life. Right-of use assets are subject to impairment or adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

The Association has elected not to recognise a right-of-use asset and corresponding lease liability for short-term leases with terms of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. Lease payments on these assets are expensed to profit or loss as incurred.

Impairment of assets

At the end of each reporting period, the association assesses whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in surplus or deficit.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Where the future economic benefits of the asset are not primarily dependent upon the asset's ability to generate net cash inflows and when the entity would, if deprived of the asset, replace its remaining future economic benefits, value in use is determined as the depreciated replacement cost of an asset.

Trade and other payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liabilities outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Lease liabilitie

A lease liability is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The lease liability is initially recognised at the present value of the lease payments to be made over the term of the lease, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the Association's incremental borrowing rate. Lease payments comprise of fixed payments less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees, exercise price of a purchase option when the exercise of the option is reasonably certain to occur, and any anticipated termination penalties. The variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Lease liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The carrying amounts are remeasured if there is a change in the following: future lease payments arising from a change in an index or a rate used; residual guarantee; lease term; certainty of a purchase option and termination penalties. When a lease liability is remeasured, an adjustment is made to the corresponding right-of use asset, or to profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset is fully written down.

Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

Goods and Services Tax ('GST')

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

Revenue

Facility funding

Facility development funds are recognised in surplus or deficit in the period in which the associated costs are incurred. Funds received in advance are recognised as a liability until costs are incurred and revenue is recognised.

Grant revenue

Grant revenue is recognised in surplus or deficit in the period in which associated costs are incurred.

Donations

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received

Interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Services revenue

Revenue from rendering services is recognised over time as the services are rendered and the performance obligation is satisfied.

NOTE 3. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS, ESTIMATES AND ASSUMPTIONS

The Association evaluates estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and industry data, obtained both externally and within the Association. Information about estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses are provided below.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The incorporated association determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation charges for its property, plant and equipment. The depreciation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Comparative Figures


